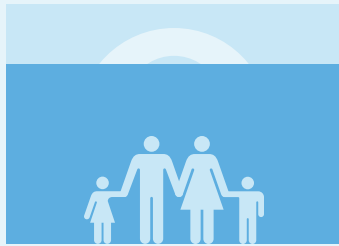

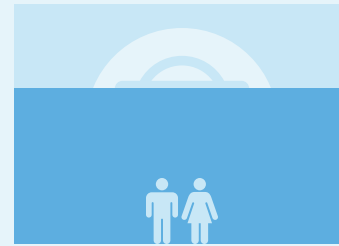

It is a privilege and pleasure to share the progress LCH has made this past fiscal year. We have fully implemented Person-Centered Care, increasing our ability to guide individuals on a pathway to progress in health, social support, education, and in the job market. We have invested in new infrastructure to track and measure the impact of our services by configuring and implementing a new organization-wide data system — LCH Centricity. With this tool, LCH is able to provide services that take into account social determinants such as access to healthy food, safe housing, education and environmental factors, and via Centricity we can meaningfully measure that impact.

LCH understands the value of truly integrated services and we have made improvements to our physical space to reflect that value. The front office was remodeled to promote a sense of unity and improve customer service. We also added a new medical exam room, four private consultation offices, and a child learning area to meet the growing need for services.

LCH builds on a more than 40 year history of helping the southern Chester County community to stay healthy, build strong families and lead productive lives by providing high-quality, culturally welcoming services. **We are especially proud of expanding our mission even further by opening a new health center in Oxford in December 2015.** The new site in Oxford strengthens our ability to reach and improve the health status of some of the most vulnerable families in our region. Our growth into Oxford complements new services in Kennett Square such as a medication dispensary for patients of the health center and a job placement program that links local employers with those looking for work.

We also launched a new logo for LCH that positions us to reach deeper into the community to ensure that all low-income residents know we are here for them. With our ability to support the community in English and in Spanish, we warmly welcome all. Our logo emphasizes our core belief that at LCH — **Life Changes Here**. Our ability to change lives for the better is only possible with your generous support. We are so grateful.

CENTERED ON CARE

The complex needs of those we serve require a holistic and integrated approach to care. Treating individuals and families for their presenting problem alone — a particular health problem, for example — may not help overcome the multiple life challenges they often face. With Person-Centered Care, LCH is better able to address all of the pressures in their lives and deliver an integrated set of health care, education, and social services to put them on the path toward good health, stable families, and economic independence.

This new model of care is possible by leveraging technology in a better way — one that is active and reactive — allowing LCH staff to fully understand and track the different facets of a person's needs. Our ability to help others help themselves has expanded exponentially with this technology.

Anthony has been a health center patient for a number of years. He told his nurse that he needed help applying for insurance for his family. The nurse made an internal referral to a Social Assistance resource specialist to schedule an enrollment appointment. As a result, Anthony's needs were immediately met — the appointment was scheduled that same day, and he left LCH in good health and with a completed insurance application. Anthony later received his insurance card in the mail, and continues to use LCH as his primary care provider with peace of mind that one illness will not be financially devastating to his family.

Luisa was in search of childcare assistance. During the screening process, Luisa mentioned that she had lost her job several months ago and was having difficulty finding work and caring for her three young children. She was feeling anxious and depressed. After completing the application, the resource specialist connected Luisa with the Education and Workforce Development team, who helped her find a job. The resource specialist also referred Luisa to LCH's behavioral health program, where a counselor helped Luisa explore different strategies to manage stress. Still actively employed, Luisa just began attending citizenship class at LCH and intends to take her citizenship exam this year.



A FRESH START

LCH's warm, central gathering space has replaced what was previously a small reception area with two separate waiting rooms. During the construction, LCH was able to provide all of our services off-site thanks to the generosity of Shiloh Presbyterian Church, St. Rocco Catholic Church, Maternal and Child Health Family Center, and the Women's Center OB/GYN in Jennersville.

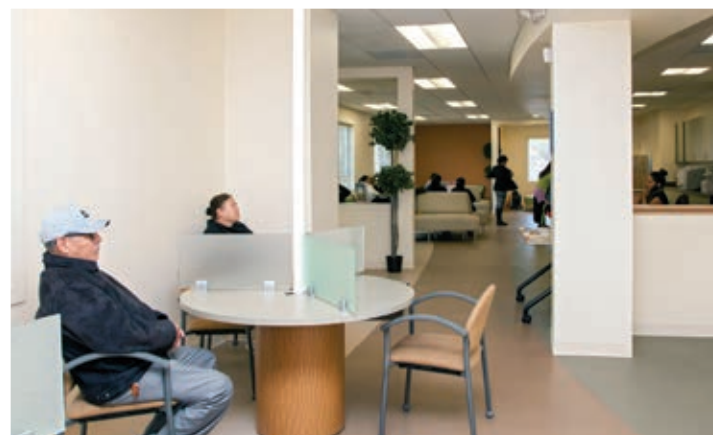
The new welcome area is now fully renovated, and will soon include phone and computer stations for clients to register for appointments, check lab results, and find

community resources. The self-service kiosks will be an exciting tool to empower our clients to learn new technology, and gain confidence and independence.

In addition to the renovated welcome area, LCH added an exam room, consultation rooms, and a call center to allow us to see more patients and decrease waiting time. These changes have enhanced our ability to help families improve their lives.

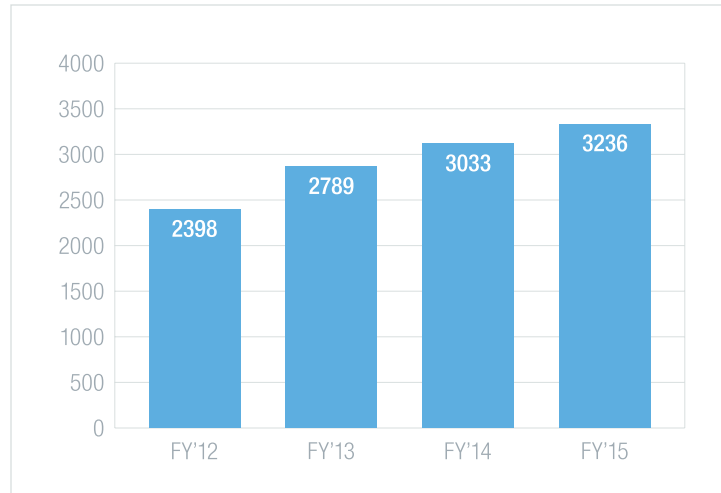
LCH NURSE



HEALTH CENTER HIGHLIGHTS

➤ GROWING PATIENTS AND EXPANDING CAPACITY

LCH served 3,236 unduplicated patients in the health center, totaling in 12,116 visits. To meet growing need, LCH hired a Certified Diabetic Educator/RN; a family practice physician focusing on metabolic disease; and two medical assistants. LCH is grateful for the generous support of lab testing by Chester County Hospital, which resulted in 16 additional openings weekly for providers to see more patients.



➤ ESTABLISHING PRENATAL CARE

LCH served 235 women in the prenatal program. LCH established monthly meetings with community health nurses to focus on prenatal care coordination. In partnership with the Chester County Hospital, 16 women and their partners and family members attended group classes on prenatal care and breastfeeding.

➤ SERVING WOMEN

LCH became the only site in Chester County to offer the Healthy Woman Program, providing free breast and cervical cancer screenings to 57 underinsured patients in partnership with local hospitals. LCH also offers family planning, education, and consultation.

➤ MANAGING CHRONIC CARE

Through nurse consultation and in partnership with the Penn State Extension's Dining with Diabetes program, the number of LCH patients with uncontrolled diabetes (an A1C greater than 9%) decreased from 40% to 33%.

➤ STRENGTHENING BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

Since January, 2,008 members have been screened for symptoms of depression, 263 of whom have been positive. LCH is now credentialed with Community Care Behavioral Health; started a pilot of the Common Ground approach in primary care with Pat Deegan and Associates; and joined Community Care Behavioral Health's FQHC Collaborative.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATION:

➤ NUTRITION EDUCATION

With the Chester County Food Bank, 30 participants attended six classes to learn how to prepare family meals with fresh produce.

➤ WELLNESS THROUGH FAMILY ACTIVITIES

Longwood Gardens and the Land Conservancy of Southern Chester County organized a health walk and education for more than 300 LCH clients.

➤ EYE CARE SCREENINGS

With the Eagles Eye Mobile, LCH offered 36 eye screenings to school age children, of whom 30 needed glasses.

➤ FLU OUTREACH

With the support of local mushroom farms, LCH administered 380 vaccines at local work sites, 408 during LCH's annual community wellness event, and 92 in the LCH walk-in clinic.



EDUCATION AND JOBS HIGHLIGHTS

➤ EXPANDING JOB PLACEMENT SERVICES

LCH created a network of over 100 local businesses and matched over 70 clients seeking work, a 71% success rate.

➤ GROWING ENGLISH PROFICIENCY

Over 200 adults took English as a second language class; more than half improved by at least one level of proficiency.

➤ PREPARING FOR THE GED

LCH helped 38 adults prepare for the high school equivalency (GED) exam. We are adapting our GED preparation curriculum to reflect the new, higher national standards to better prepare our clients for success.

➤ ACHIEVING CITIZENSHIP

12 students became U.S. citizens, continuing LCH's 100% success rate of students attending classes and passing the test.

➤ PROVIDING LEGAL ASSISTANCE

LCH helped 198 members to resolve immigration, domestic relations, labor, civil and landlord issues.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATION:

➤ PARTNERSHIPS IN PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

20 members interested in starting their own business completed an eight-week entrepreneurial course through SCORE and Kutztown University's Latino Business Resource Center. Wings for Success provided two interview workshop sessions for eight LCH clients.

➤ FINANCIAL GUIDANCE AND EDUCATION

LCH filed 143 tax returns in partnership with the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program, bringing clients \$265,083 in returns.

SOCIAL ASSISTANCE HIGHLIGHTS

➤ SUPPORTING THE COMMUNITY

LCH provided 2,505 unduplicated members with a wide range of community support services.

➤ EXPANDING CAPACITY

The new electronic health record system decreased Social Assistance reporting time from 6 hours to 30 minutes, allowing 5.5 additional hours for direct services each week.

➤ NAVIGATING THE HEALTH CARE SYSTEM

LCH submitted a total of 1,976 health insurance applications for individuals. 90% were approved.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATION:

➤ IN-KIND DONATIONS FOR FAMILIES

80 school-aged children received backpacks, 200 children received coats, and 90 families received extra support during the holiday season thanks to the generosity of local churches, community groups, and individuals.



MOVING FORWARD WITH OUR MISSION

Thanks to the ongoing progress of our FortyForward Campaign, chaired by Alice K. Moorhead, LCH has taken dramatic steps to adapt its programs, technology and facilities to a new model of care that will have an even greater impact on the health of the individual and the community.

Thanks to our friends who have so generously supported our campaign, we have been able to:

- Expand Services and implement Person-Centered Care to integrate all services into a singular, managed plan of care for better patient outcomes.
- Purchase, customize, and implement LCH Centricity, our new Electronic Health Record System which provides comprehensive patient information to facilitate care management and decision-making.
- Renovate our facility to create a more welcoming front entrance, better patient flow and additional exam rooms and clinical space.

With \$1.5 million remaining to reach our goal of \$4.5 million, we continue to move forward as we enhance and expand our services to address current and unmet needs in our community. We thank all those who have made this progress possible, and welcome the support of new friends as we continue to build and strengthen our community — one person, one family at a time.



EXPANDING TO OXFORD

As communities evolve, needs evolve. The Oxford area (Oxford, Cochranville, Lincoln University, West Grove and Nottingham) is a medically underserved community for those who are uninsured and underinsured. This expansion is part of our ongoing effort to meet the needs of our community, especially those who are most vulnerable.

74% of population we will serve are uninsured; 15% have Medicaid; 2% have Medicare; and 9% have private insurance.
